### **Conservation Officer's Report**

An issue that has been generating concern in recent weeks is the amount of rope left in situ in caves. Some has an obvious purpose, for example supporting an on-going dig. For others, the purpose is less obvious. Abandoned ropes are a problem both on safety grounds and on conservation grounds. Should we take any action? Publicity to suggest people should not to leave ropes in place? Actively remove ropes ( having checked first that they are not there for a purpose)? – and if so, how vigorously should we try to reunite ropes with their owners?

CNCC continues to support cavers in conservation work, including replacement/repair of three stiles in the Alum Pot area, and lending equipment to support KCC in their clean-up of Glasfurd's Chamber in Gavel Pot.

Those who are planning conservation works are reminded that Sam Allshorn has money donated by Mike Cooper from sales of "Not for the Faint Hearted" which is available for conservation work on caves featured in the book.

### **New training workshops added**

We have had a very successful “summer program” of workshops with all of them going to “Full”.

Since making a return to caving at a somewhat advanced age , I have been very impressed by the role which CNCC is playing in the sport, in training, in access, in the provision and monitoring of anchors and in providing very detailed and accurate rigging information for a huge number of caves. Long may it continue to flourish!

## A Report to the CNCC committee regarding “pull through” anchors in Heron Pot

At a recent CNCC committee meeting a request was received to consider the addition of a couple of anchors in Heron Pot to facilitate a better pull through solution on the first pitch.

The second pitch is suitable due to a recently installed second anchor in a good position.

The first pitch in Heron really has 2 “pitch heads”, the first goes down with the water and there are no anchors at the top of this. The CNCC description suggests using the first anchors (Start of the traverse) for a pull through here. The “second” pitch head (Dryer) is reached by a fairly technical traverse. At the second pitch head it is anchored for a “standard” Y Hang but not suitable for a 2 anchor pull through.

Options for Heron Pot.

1. Do nothing
2. Add an extra anchor at the “2nd pitch head” to use in conjunction with one of the existing ones to facilitate a 2 anchor pull through. (A dryer hang but need to negotiate the traverse)
3. Add 2 anchors at the first pitch head to provide a simple pull through solution. (Simple but potentially wet)
4. Do options 1 and 2 to give more options.



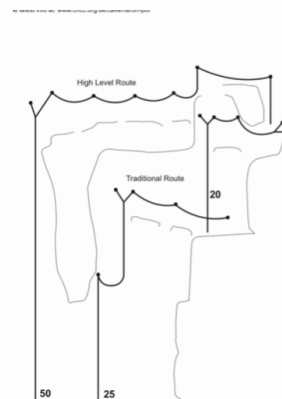
The 2nd pitch with an extra anchor for a good Pull through

## **A Report to the CNCC committee regarding anchors in Simpson's pot.**

At a recent CNCC committee meeting a request was received from Chris Boardman (BCA Child protection officer and cave instructor who regularly takes pupils from his school in Birmingham caving in the Yorkshire Dales including through Simpson's pot.)

The main request was for an extra anchor at the start of the traverse just after the "duck".

I agreed to go and have a look and report back. I thought it would also be useful to check all the other anchors and placements.

### **Results:**

The request for an extra anchor can easily be achieved by a simple drilled thread in a well positioned flake of rock at the start of the traverse.

### **Other points to consider.**

There are a few anchors which are showing some movement which would benefit from replacing.

None of the pitches except one, are anchored in a way that allows a good set up for a pull through. (The initial anchoring was obviously done for "traditional SRT).

The current Topo doesn't match with the actual cave and requires an update.

A number of pitches don't allow a traverse rope to be installed during a pull through trip as the current set up is to use the preceding pitch rope to access the next pitch when rigging for standard SRT.

The top of the Great Aven is in quite a considerable mess with a large amount of "Tat" to provide a pull through solution as the current anchors do not support this.

Slit pot has a high level bypass which appears to becoming a more used way of accessing this pitch. The anchors are variable and again consist of some "Tat" to achieve a pull through.

A committee discussion about the above and any actions thought needed would be useful.

*(My personal thoughts: Simpson's Pot is one of the Dales "Jewels in the Crown" and a classic pull through trip.*

*The anchor placements do not currently facilitate an efficient and safe descent as a pull through trip.*

*This cave is used by cavers of all abilities and a CNCC anchor provision that accommodates this has got to be a good thing. Different provision for different caves seems sensible to me. Sell Gill Vs Quaking Pot ?*

*Of course "people have managed all this time" and if the committee decide to leave it as it is then all well and good.*

*A relatively small amount of work would improve the anchor situation in this cave and remove some unsightly anchors and get rid of a significant amount of "Tat".)*

## **PR and Communications Officer's Report - Matt Ewles**

The last three months has seen a pleasing selection of news stories to help keep the work of CNCC at the forefront of minds:

### **Conservation:**

The work at Alum Pot to replace three stiles; Thank you to all our volunteers.

### **Safety:**

Warnings about ash dieback, and a loose rock in Lancaster Hole entrance.

### **Access:**

Re-opening of White Scar Cave; Great effort by the Craven Pothole Club.

### **Website:**

The overhaul of the CNCC website and publishing of new topos/descriptions for F'ing Hopeless Pot.

### **Training:**

Winter 2022-2023 program published, and a nice article with pictures from a recent training session (thanks Adele for the photos).

### **Promoting caving:**

The current display at the Yorkshire Dales National Park headquarters in Bainbridge, which now looks likely to remain in place for the rest of this year at least. Thanks to Tim Allen for taking the lead on this one, identifying the opportunity, producing the prints and putting the display up. If anyone is passing through Wensleydale midweek (during office hours) and can call in, please do and sign the visitor book.

### **Communication:**

Newsletter 12 has been published in the last week and paper copies currently being distributed. These newsletters are less frequent than they used to be, but now that we have such a strong following on social media and via our mailing list, they serve more as a compilation of news and our work, rather than a frontline means of communication. Nevertheless I have left this issue a little longer than I should since the last (18 months) so am going to try to do one annually from now on.

All of the above have been communicated to the caving community through UKCaving, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and of course via our own mailing list which now stands at 424 subscribers. I provide a roughly monthly summary of news to the mailing list, including an update on any major ongoing situations (for example, during the closure of White Scar, and the ongoing issues at High Birkwith and Wretched Rabbit). The mailing list also gets one-day advanced notice on training workshops before their publication is announced more widely.

In other work, I have continued to manage our cave descriptions and topos, updating several in response to caver feedback (thanks to Gary who actually draws and uploads the topos).

I would like to pay personal tribute to Roy Holmes, who passed away in September. Roy was Chairman when I became CNCC Secretary back in 2014, at a time of turbulence. Roy gave a stoic and authoritative presence throughout these meetings without pushing any particular agenda and even maintaining a good wit and humour. In doing this, somehow, out of all turbulence, a revitalised CNCC emerged in no small part thanks to his efforts to moderate the meetings. Northern caving has lost a great character, not to mention an enthusiastic CRO volunteer and prolific explorer.

There are a few things to discuss at this meeting that are not on the agenda. Firstly, the anchors in Heron Pot, which Ian has (I believe) raised in his report. I have initiated a discussion on UKCaving about this to try to gather some opinions (link below). I was surprised by the diversity of opinions, which ranged from people being dead against additional anchors in a currently safe to descend cave, to those who greatly support additional anchors to cater for pull-through situations or to reflect caver abilities at this particular location. Whatever the outcome, I think it is really important to get the widest possible engagement on situations like this so CNCC can keep a sanity check that what we are doing really is widely supported, particularly when it comes to drilling holes into caves.

Secondly, there is a separate discussion on UKCaving (link below) about the appearance of new fixed ropes particularly in Simpson/Swinsto on the traverses which are currently blocking people from rigging their own ropes for pull-through. Clearly, it is poor etiquette for any fixed rigging to be monopolising anchors in this way without very good reason. Does the CNCC wish to take any action in respect to this, not necessarily hands-on, but perhaps advisory or some kind of good-practice guidance?

## **Webmaster's Report - Gary Douthwaite**

### **New CNCC website**

Since the last report, the new website has finally been finished. This year-long project has completely re-written the underlying code to keep up to date with modern security standards. The old site was the same underlying structure as the original created in 2014 and had had many additions over the years making it rather hard to handle. The front UI has also been re-designed to meet the latest standards with a more consistent look, better user experience and much better mobile usability. The site is now built on the well documented Bootstrap framework which will make it easier for anyone to take it on in the future.

Some of the new features include:

1. New layout and more filter options for cave access page and cave details pages.
2. News articles make better use of images with a scrolling carousel with touch functionality for mobile devices. Better sharing and visibility across social media platforms.
3. A dedicated page for warnings, bringing them all together in one place (as well as on individual cave info pages).
4. A new reporting system to report a range of issues. Defective anchor reports are now automatically added to the anchor installers website and all installers are notified by email that something needs attention. An installer can then assign themselves to the job if they are able to.
5. The training section has been redesigned and the booking system simplified. A payment information report is also available for the treasurer showing incoming payments and card fees.
6. A streamlined admin area with much simpler interface to upload files and update content.
7. Gaping Gill info page aimed at cavers explaining how access works on winch days and showing the upcoming winch meets. This information has been lacking on the site and many people did not know the procedure, particularly those visiting from outside the area.
8. A new file structure keeping all the uploaded documents and images in the same place. Download statistics and charts are available for all files. The download process for the end user is also now more reliable.

### **Gaping Gill website: [gaping-gill.info](http://gaping-gill.info)**

As discussed, and agreed at a previous meeting, a new Gaping Gill website has been created aimed at the non-caving public. A number of people had mistaken the cave booking system as a method of booking for the Gaping Gill winch, so this site aims to clarify things. The idea is to have a central point of information to give publicly to direct people to the right information for the relevant winch meet. The site also shows the upcoming dates already in use on the main CNCC site. It is fairly simple now but will expand over the coming months – any ideas welcome.

### **Analytics**

#### **Google**

Google Analytics has changed its analytics service to v4 and data is no longer shown in the way it used to be. The new system does not show past data and has only been in place on the site for about three months. The way the new data is represented is not practical for a CNCC report as it is meant to be viewed live.

- Instagram: 418 followers (+16 since Jun report).

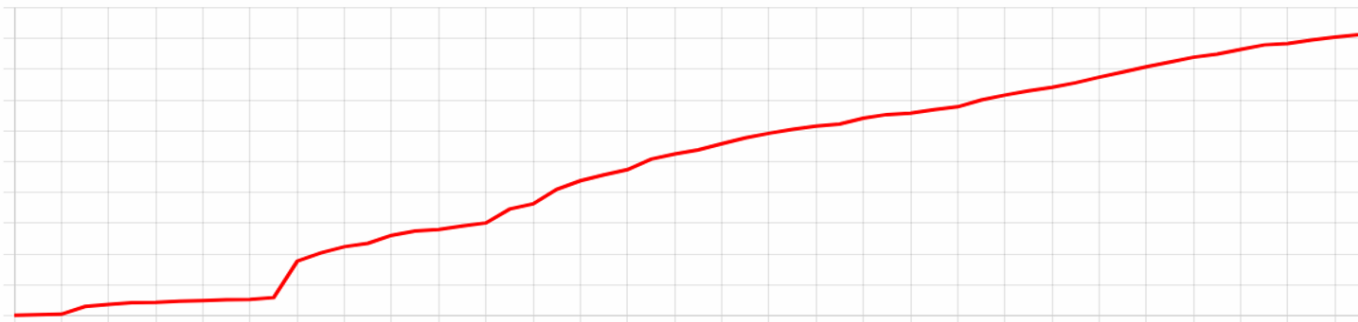
#### **Mailing List**

- The mailing list contains **424** people (**1** have requested to be unsubscribed).

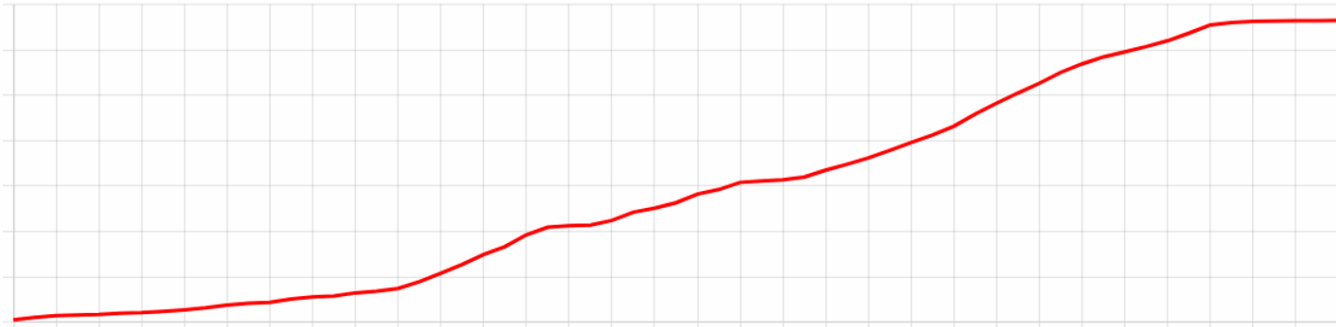
#### **Online Booking System**

- 3853 individual bookings have been made. This number includes 3321 approved bookings and 531 cancelled bookings.

- The average age is 49 with the youngest 19 and oldest 81.

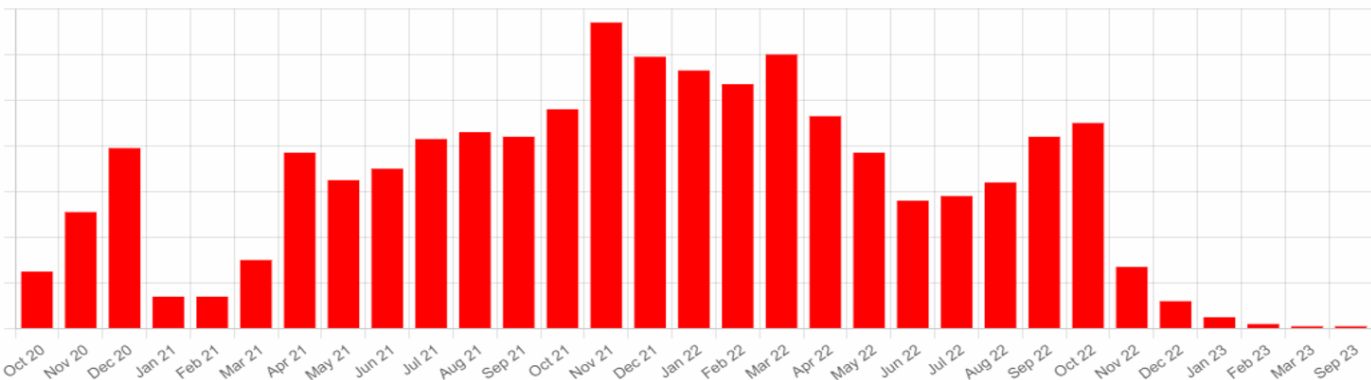
New booking system registrations:
