CNCC Conservation Officers Report 2010

In the last 12 months the following conservation projects have been undertaken by CNCC volunteers and financed by Natural England through the Northern Caves Monitoring Project:

- 1. Cow Pot Fencing/ Walling and Tree Planting;
- 2. Long Churns Fencing and Access Improvements;
- 3. Interpretation Panel fitted at Alum Pot Lane;
- 4. Yordas Wood walling /fencing and stock control gating;
- 5. Browgill stile replacement;
- 6. Gaping Gill area dig capping with concrete lintels;
- 7. Aygill Cavern entrance stabilisation;
- 8. Red Moss Pot entrance rebuilt with stock proof cover;
- 9. Shuttleworth Pot entrance pipe and construction materials costs;
- 10. Cup cake Pot materials costs.

We have also supplied stainless steel conservation pins and tape for newly opened discoveries at Voldamort and Shuttleworth Pot.

I have liaised with colleagues at Natural England to gain NE Consent for digs at Cupcake, Shuttleworth, and most current activities in GG area.

I have responded to the YDNP consultation paper on the future of Victoria Cave(with my NE hat on).

I have presented talks on Cave Conservation and the NCMP to Hidden Earth and CHECC Conferences.

I have also had opportunities to raise the profile of Cave SSSIs within Natural England and its regional staff, who have responded in a positive way. Many NE staff attended the BCRA Cave Biology Field Meeting in Littondale and some attended Hidden Earth.

All the work undertaken by CNCC and the conservation volunteers has been written up and published in Descent and Speleology.

There are other conservation projects to complete before the end of March 2011.
